WHERE THE TRAILS BEGIN: THE LOVE STORY OF RICK AND ANN

One sunlit day in the summer of 2003, Ann was at Lower Pond with her sister Cecelia, soaking in the breathtaking landscape of Reinstein Woods. As the friendly faces of Rick and Steve approached, a conversation began, dancing with curiosity and laughter. Captivated by Ann's charm and binoculars, Rick confided in Steve his hope to see her again.

That hope flickered into reality when Rick spotted Ann at a Fall Festival training. With a playful grin, he asked, "Haven't I seen you someplace before?" Rick's heart soared when Ann responded with equal warmth.

Soon after, their weekends became a tapestry woven with shared wanderings through the enchanting Reinstein Woods. Their quirky sense of humor turned even the most mundane moments into cherished memories, binding them closer with each laugh. As their friendship grew so did their romantic journey. Rick's knowledge of the trees meshed perfectly with Ann's enthusiasm for birds.

By the end of the year, Ann's family affectionately dubbed them "Ranger Rick" and "Audubon Annie." They continued to infuse joy into the Fall Festivals and led nature tours with boundless enthusiasm. Toward the end of 2005, Rick led Ann back to the Lower Pond Trail, where their paths first crossed, and proposed under the whispering trees.

Ann joyfully accepted, and by 2006, they found solace in a cozy house in South Buffalo. Their urban haven soon blossomed with nature's touch—seven new trees, vibrant flower pots, a rock garden, and a bountiful vegetable patch. Together, they explored Western New York by foot, skis, and canoe, embracing every season with wonder.

Tragically, Ann faced a courageous battle against gastrointestinal cancer, and in early 2024, she passed away. Rick cherished their 21 years together as the most beautiful of his life. The memories of their time in Reinstein Woods, where their enchanting love story began, remain a cherished solace in his heart. Each whisper of the trees and each rustle of leaves carries echoes of their laughter and love, a poignant reminder of what once was and what will forever reside in his heart.



Recognizing the significance of Reinstein Woods to Ann, her loved ones designated memorial donations to benefit the Friends of Reinstein Woods. These donations play a vital role in preserving this cherished place.

By 2027, Friends of Reinstein Woods will demonstrate additional growth and progress in the following key areas:




How do the Friends of Reinstein Woods achieve this?





PATHWAYS TEENS CLEAN UP A CREEK









Since fall, our ten Pathways to Environmental Learning students have explored diverse environmental careers while gaining valuable environmental education and outreach skills. Recently they not only learned about their local environment but became stewards of it.

The teens organized a cleanup of Scajaquada Creek not far from Cheektowaga Central High School. Through school morning announcements, flyers, and collaboration with the Conservation Club, the students recruited about 20 enthusiastic volunteers who collected an impressive 68 pounds of trash and five pounds of recyclables in just two hours, as well as a shopping cart!

"The students were very excited to create change along Scajacuada Creek, where they've been doing water testing since October," said Reinstein Educator and Pathways Coordinator Maeve Sweeney. "They were excited to work with their peers and to educate them on why cleanups are important."



PATHWAYS CONTINUED

The students created posters and brochures to educate participants and school members about threats to the creek and what can be done to protect it.

It was a delight to witness our students orchestrate such a vibrant event caring for the creek that they've learned so much about. Other stewardship projects they'll be completing this spring include building raised garden beds for the Woodland Garden at Reinstein Woods, and sharing the results of their water testing with community. MARYVALE VISITS REINSTEIN WOODS

You may recall from past newsletters that our Educator Sarah Klos, along with interns, has been leading weekly nature programs with students from Maryvale Primary and Union East Elementary Schools. After diving into the wonders of watersheds and how to protect them, what better way to learn about wetlands than by seeing one in person on a guided tour around Reinstein Woods. More than 30 students and staff from Maryvale Primary School visited Reinstein over spring break thanks to a grant from the North American Association for Environmental Education (NAAEE). In addition to hearing the sounds of woodpeckers and seeing painted turtles soaking up the sun, the students got to view wetland dioramas that had been made by students in the "STEM in the Schoolyard: Watershed Engineers" after-school program. The dioramas were on display at Reinstein Woods in honor of Earth Month.



For Maryvale student Isabel, it was a storybook moment coming full circle. This was her first time seeing her wetland diorama in person creating it. Her face lit up to see her masterpiece proudly displayed in the Education Center for all to see. She even friend arabbed а and told the chaperones about her and her classmates' time working on it.



WOODLAND GARDEN UPDATE

Friends of Reinstein Woods has received a \$20,717 grant from the Environmental Protection Fund's Park and Trail Partnership Grants program to enable visitor access and improve habitats in the Woodland Garden Enclosure at Reinstein Woods Nature Preserve.

The 2025 grant will provide special gates so trail visitors can access the enclosure while keeping out deer. Inside, raised garden beds, constructed by teens from Cheektowaga High School, will provide a safe space to grow a variety of native wildflowers that normally would not survive being eaten by the large deer population at Reinstein Woods. Shrubs and other native wild plants will be added along a footpath. Benches and educational signs will provide opportunities for visitors to reflect and enjoy the peaceful setting. The Woodland Garden also provides opportunities for local students to study and learn about the forest ecosystem.

During <u>I Love My Park Day</u> on May 3, volunteers from the University at Buffalo and Friends of Reinstein Woods reinforced portions of the fence, cleared the future footpath path of debris, and cleared the area where the raised garden beds will be installed. The path and gates are expected to be completed by late 2025.

The Woodland Garden project was supported by a New York State Park and Trail Partnership Grant and New York's Environmental Protection Fund. The Park and Trail Partnership Grants are administered by Parks & Trails New York, in partnership with the NYS Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation.







TRAIL THURSDAYS

We are seeking volunteers to assist with enhancing our trails! Activities include, trail maintenance, trash cleanup, invasive species removal, and weeding our garden beds. We gather every Thursday from 6 PM to 8 PM, and this initiative will run until September!
